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Olympic Torch Relay in Saga

The Tokyo Olympic was held from July 23rd to August 8th. One of the well-known Olympic events is the torch relay a relay where the torch bearer would pass on the Olympic flame which was lit in Greece. The flame was then passed on throughout Japan by torch bearers in each prefecture from 25 March 2021 to 8 July 2021. The destination of the flame is the cauldron at the New National Stadium in Tokyo. The flame then will be left burning during the 16 days of the Games.

The flame passed our province Saga during the 9th of May from Tara to Karatsu and during the 10th of May from Kiyama to Saga. On the route from Tara to Karatsu, Miss Mishima Mai from Saga University Regional Innovation Center participated the events as one of the torch bearers. As Mishima-san has been promoting the relationship between Thai and Japan as a student and also a member of Sawasdee Saga, a Thai lover group in Saga since she was a student. Thai students from Saga University went to the venue to cheer her on. The television network NHK also filmed the events and interviewed Mishima-san and Thai students before and during the relay. The production technology used to produce the torch is the same technology with the Shinkansen bullet train. How cool is that!!

Job Hunting in Japan

One of SUISA members, Alvin Junkou Lean has decided to get a job in Japan. We asked him about job hunting in Japan as an international student.

What is the reason for you to find a job in Japan?

One of the reasons is the salary I can get as a fresh graduate in Japan was about 3 times more than what I would have earned in Malaysia. Also, Japan is one of the few countries, if not the only one that takes fresh graduate actively. Thus, I figured why not take the opportunity and get into a Japanese company since I'm already here.

How is the process of getting a job looks like in Japan.

So for me, I registered myself to a recruiting site call 'My Navi' with the introduction from my faculty. From there, you are able to find a whole list of companies that are recruiting for that year. As I thought scrolling through hundreds of companies choosing the one that I'm interested was a hard enough, I then had to send entry sheets or a resume for them to get a chance to proceed to the next step. After my resume passed the first screen, there was online exams to test your knowledge and also your personality to see the compatibility with the company.



After you pass it, interviews will be held, usually not once but a few times, and only after you pass through all of it you will get the job. It really felt a tedious journey just to get one job.

What do you think was the hardest part in finding job in Japan?

One of it was that I was competing against Japanese people, rather than having a special bracket for international students. Especially for companies that only have clients in Japan it seemed like there wasn't much need for them to hire an international student.

What do you think international students should be focusing on if they were to job hunt in Japan or is there any tips for them?

I would say having JLPT N1 or N2 would really give you an advantage. Especially for me, I was looking at the top firms in my

field so it felt like having N1 was almost necessarily. Another is I felt that looking for companies that works with foreign countries or companies will greatly increase your chance of getting a job as that will be where your strength as a foreigner be valued. Lastly this is not really a tip or anything but, being able to speak several language is really a big advantage compared to Japanese students so you should make it your strength and also your appeal point.
